Community Action Partnership of Madera County (CAPMC), a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, has dedicated its programs and services to address the needs of the low-income residents of Madera County for over the past fifty years. Although Madera County is our primary focus for serving low-income individuals and families, CAPMC has also been awarded funds to expand Head Start services to Regional families in Mariposa County and Migrant/Seasonal families in Fresno and Merced Counties.

CAPMC was established in 1965 as a result of the Economic Opportunity Act (EOA) of 1964. The EOA was signed into law by President Lyndon B. Johnson to support his declaration of an unconditional "War on Poverty." The act was established to promote school readiness, enhance children's social and cognitive development by providing educational, health, nutritional, social, and other services to enrolled children and their families. Each county in the United States designated a community action agency to be responsive to the needs of the low-income individuals and families by providing programs and services that assist them in becoming stable and self-reliant.

CAPMC is a leader in "helping people, changing lives." We have received local and national recognition for implementing creative, cost-effective programs to serve the low-income residents of Madera, Mariposa, Merced and Fresno counties. As the region continues to grow and change, CAPMC is also transforming itself to best serve those in need. CAPMC continues to examine its current programs to ensure that they meet the highest levels of efficiency and effectiveness. As an agency, leaders regularly seek to initiate innovative programs that complement and broaden our existing ones, and search for the best practices from other agencies in our community action network. CAPMC continues to maintain the financial integrity of its programs to maximize resources to the greatest benefit of CAPMC program participants and other customers and stakeholders.

Message from the Director

Greetings from Community Action Partnership of Madera County's Head Start Department! I would like to share important information regarding the services that the Madera/Mariposa Regional and Early Head Start programs provide to the children and families of the community. Staff have compiled data for the 2017-2018 Annual Report which gives an overview of the funding, staffing, enrollment, attendance, and over all services provided by the Madera/Mariposa Regional and Early Head Start Programs.

Madera/Mariposa Regional and Early Head Start are a direct grantee of the Office of Head Start Region IX. A grant application is submitted annually and funding is awarded to CAPMC. For the 2017-2018 program year, CAPMC was funded to serve 261 preschool children and 42 children 0 to 3, including expecting mothers. By the end of the year, a total of 259 preschool and 87 Early Head Start children & families were served.

CAPMC's goal is to provide families with opportunities to engage with their children, increase their knowledge of their children's development, and ultimately, assist them in becoming their children's lifelong educators.

I want to acknowledge our exceptional staff for all their dedication to providing quality educational experiences to the children and the Policy Council and Board of Directors for their continued support. The community partners and providers that make it possible for the program to provide assistance to families in need. It is truly a "community effort" to help families meet their needs and allow children to be successful in their educational path.

A special recognition and gratitude to the families of the program that allow program staff the honor of educating and caring for their children on a daily basis. It is a privilege to be able to serve the families of Madera and Mariposa Counties.













CLASS – Classroom Assessment Scoring System

The Madera/Mariposa Regional Head Start program uses the Creative Curriculum, a research-validated system that teaches school readiness skills by responding to children's learning styles and building on their strengths and interests. In addition to academic preparation, children learn socialization and problem-solving skills.

In addition to using the Creative Curriculum, the program adopted the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) tool in order to measure the quality of environment, social and emotional aptitude, and school readiness of children. The information gathered is also used to provide training and technical assistance to staff on an on-going basis. A baseline is established at the start of the program, fall or early winter, and a follow up observation is conducted in the spring to determine progress and opportunities for growth.

CAPMC Madera/Mariposa Regional Head Start Program CLASS Results by Domain



The Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) looks at 10 dimensions of teacher student interactions and rates them on a seven-point scale. Above are the average scores for the 2017-2018 Madera/Mariposa Regional Head Start program, comparisons with the national average and thresholds expectation from the Office of Head Start. These results are extremely important as they are now used by the Office of Head Start as a way to measure the quality of programs. Therefore, based on CLASS results and, if they fall below the national average, programs could be designated for re-competition.

Percentage of Children At or Above Early Foundation Expectations Fall & Spring 2017-2018




Class Studies

Through Creative Curriculum implementation, our Regional Head Start sites have executed Studies, which are in depth projects where children become investigators and experts. Children learn to ask questions, collect data and analyze information, which are critical thinking skills that they will continue to use and develop through the school years. Regional Head Start Sites dug deep in a variety of interest areas, such as shoes, trees, clothes, recycling, balls, music, boxes, and bones, just to list a few.

Parent and community involvement was key to a successful study. Parents and community members were utilized as visiting experts and children prepared interview questions to further investigate their Study. Parents also volunteered during Field Studies to ensure child safety. Parents and their children also worked on a project at home, linking school to home activities. Children guided the Studies and teachers facilitated. Over time, children learned to become observers and had new experiences.












Family Outcomes Survey

Parents and guardians of children enrolled in CAPMC completed a survey about how they and their families benefited from the variety of services they received.





Parent Highlights 2017-2018

Parent Curriculum

The Madera/ Mariposa Regional and Early Head Start provided the Strengthening Families Program (SFP) and offered the opportunity for parents to attend the fourteen-week sessions in which they gained skills on how to build positive family relationships. Parents and children participated in SFP activities at their age level, both separately and together.

The Strengthening Families Program is a fourteen-week evidence based family skills training program found to significantly improve parenting skills and family relationships. It also improves children's behavior, social skills, reduces child depression, aggression and enhances family functioning. Furthermore, it reduces delinquency, alcohol and drug abuse in children and improves school performance. Child maltreatment also decreases as parents strengthen bonds with their children and learn more effective parenting skills.

The Strengthening Families Program includes, but is not limited to the following topics:

- Parenting Life Skills
 - o Social rewards for "good behavior"
 - o Effective discipline
 - o Clear communication
- Children's Life Skills
 - o Social and life skills
 - o Effective communication
 - o Problem-solving and coping skills
- Family Life Skills
 - o Therapeutic child play
 - o Family meetings
 - o Plan family activities

Sessions are delivered in 14 weekly two-hour group sessions. Each session begins with a meal, followed by parents' and children's classes, ending with a family group activity were parents and children practice the skills they just learned.

The following is a breakdown of the participants who attended and graduated.

SFP program registered a total of 47 parents from which 21 attended at least one class sessions. A total of 7 parents graduated and 14 parents dropped due to different circumstances.
